Training and Community Riding Center Capital Campaign




Grand Rapids has matured and developed into a world-class destination for events and has seen its downtown businesses and investments flourish through the diversity of its activities and people. Part of the allure and majesty of Grand Rapids are the big city amenities without the bother of leaving mid-west values behind. Downtown is highlighted by river walks, bridges, unique architecture and stunning cityscape views alive with distinctive food, music, dancing, and an energy unmatched by other similarly sized cities.

Part of the growth and success of Grand Rapids can be attributed to the commitment by law enforcement officials to provide a safe and enjoyable place to work, live and play. Similar to large European cities and major American metropolitan areas, Mounted Unit police play a critical part in safety, comfort and overall performance of an event. One Mounted Unit officer sits high above a crowd and is the equivalent of ten on-foot officers. They are an effective and efficient policing tool that has been part of the downtown fabric since 2007.

The Kent County Sheriff's Mounted Unit are fully-trained volunteers who contribute thousands of hours annually and save local police departments and officials hundreds of thousands of dollars each year by providing policing and safety detail at major events throughout the city and county. Nearly 80% of the Mounted Unit assignments are in partnership with the Grand Rapids Police Department in the downtown district for events such as ArtPrize, Celebration on the Grand, Blues on the Mall, 4th of July, New Year's Eve, the River Bank Run, Metro Cruise, concerts, ethnic celebrations and more. The Mounted Unit also serves as the one of the few Search and Rescue teams in the State, often called on to find the lost or abducted.

Please join in this important campaign and support the Mounted Unit Division Training and Community Riding Center. Phase 1 of the campaign was successfully completed in 2011 and we have nearly achieved our Phase 2 campaign goals, BUT WE NEED YOUR HELP TO THE FINISH LINE! Building and Training Needs

A permanent training facility is needed to ensure the longevity and specialized training of the Unit. The most visible and essential parts of the campaign include an expansive indoor training arena for year-round training and a multi-use auxiliary outdoor arena for our Sheriff Department horses, as well as use for 4-H, local middle and high school equestrian team riders and recreational riding for our Veterans and local emergency first responders. A comprehensive break-down is listed below.


By creating a multi-use facility for community programs and the horses of the Mounted Unit, opportunities to teach and reach youth will be abundant. Such programs provide participants the chance to experience opportunities outside of their neighborhoods and to meet a diversity of people, including other youth and adults. Children will build social skills, teamwork and experience a world far beyond their own, preparing them for life and enabling them to picture their place in the world with endless possibilities.



In 2011, the Kent County Parks Department donated 30 acres of rolling property located in NE Grand Rapids for the Mounted Unit Campaign, valued at over \$250,000.

Since inception, the Mounted Unit has experienced 400% growth in assignments in just 5 years. Last year, the Mounted Patrol were called to duty on 55 separate dates and events.

The Mounted Unit of the Kent County Sheriff's Department proudly serves all residents of Kent County, helping our communities provide a safer and more enjoyable place to live and work. You may have seen us on patrol at many of the large community events around downtown or throughout the county. The Mounted Unit also patrols Millennium Park and provides Search and Rescue operations throughout the State of Michigan. We are committed to community and educational partnerships that enhance the quality of life in Kent County. Inner-city youth riding and



educational programs, summer camps, field trips for school children and youth groups, recreational riding for military veterans, and local school equestrian competitions and clinics are only a few planned initiatives in our new facilities that help mentor, educate and build-up the character and self-worth of individuals.
